<p>MAYOR'S GREETINGS SENT TO MOOSE OFFICIALS</p> <p>Senator Davis and Katherine Smith Attend Conference</p> <p>Mrs. M. Newbolt Institutes Providence Women's Chapter, Assisted by Local Members</p> <p>Mayor Henry S. Wheeler, Saturday, in a telegram to Mrs. Margaret Newbolt, past regent of Eleanor Thomas Boeckman Chapter, Women of the Moose, extended his greetings to James J. Davis, senior Senator from Pennsylvania, and director general of the Loyal Order of the Moose, and Katherine Smith, of Washington, D. C., grand recorder, both of whom he knew while secretary to Congressman Clark Budick in Washington, and who were in Providence to be at the first New England Pilgrimage Conference of the Moose at the Crown Hotel.</p> <p>Mrs. Newbolt, who is in general charge of arrangements for the Women of the Moose last Friday at exercises at the Crown Hotel, instituted a Providence Chapter of Women of the Moose and temporary organization plans were formulated.</p> <p>"The ties of the Women of the Moose," Mrs. Newbolt said, "is to bring into the homes of the country the ideal of Mooseheart, our child city. Mooseheart is a true home. Children are brought up in ideal surroundings, many of them under the care of their own mothers in their own homes at Mooseheart. The degree team included: Mrs. Julia Moore, Mrs. Jane Fox, Mrs. Marion Moore, Mrs. Elvira Whitmarsh, Mrs. Emily Peabody, Mrs. Margaret Hayward, Mrs. Margaret Lawless and Mrs. Marian Fulk, all of this city.</p>	<p>KIRKPATRICK DEATH FOUND ACCIDENTAL</p> <p>Autopsy Performed Friday by Medical Examiner Butler; Note Found Beside Body</p> <p>Following an autopsy performed last Friday afternoon Dr. Maurice J. Butler, medical examiner, said that the death of Colonel Thomas J. Kirkpatrick, (MC) U. S. A., (retired) was accidental. Death, he said, was due to a hemorrhage caused by a knife wound in the right ventricle of the heart. The officer was found dead on the floor of his home on Grinnell street, Jamestown, Friday morning when his servant, Mary Medeiros, arrived to start her day's work.</p> <p>Chief of Police Chester Green of Jamestown was notified and he called Dr. Henry Ercyrd of Jamestown and Dr. Butler, lying beside the body, officials said, was a note: "I had a knife in my hand and a gun—" indicating that death occurred before the officer could finish writing on the back of an envelope with a stub of pencil.</p> <p>Colonel Kirkpatrick, who had not been in the best of health for some time, was said to have had a weak heart. He was well known in Jamestown as an amateur gardener and it is believed he was either going to or coming from his garden when the accident occurred and that he fell on the pruning knife, which was in his hand.</p>	<p>CHAUFFEUR'S BALL ATTENDED BY OVER 600</p> <p>Indications Are Several Hundred Dollars Will Be Netted for Christmas Fund</p> <p>The revenue from the chauffeurs ball held at Newport Beach last Friday will be used to provide a Christmas fund for children of unemployed chauffeurs, and indications are that several hundred dollars will be netted.</p> <p>The ball proved to be a success, as there were over 600 persons in attendance, and the business men and merchants lent their co-operation.
