## Enter to Learn ...

Penelope was a single mother, working long hours and multiple jobs to support herself and her two sons. Living far away from relatives and extended family, she was unable to provide Robb and Ben with the proper amount of support and supervision. As Robb and Ben grew older, the neighborhood where they lived began to deteriorate and soon became dangerous. The boys often had to face violence both at school and in their community. Penelope struggled to find safe community resources and activities for Robb and Ben, and worried about them being negatively influenced by their environment. Penelope reached out to Mooseheart after learning about it from a family friend. Robb and Ben now live in a safe and healthy environment, where they enjoy being active in the community and participating in school and sports without worry. Penelope is reassured knowing that her boys are now surrounded by positive influences and opportunities.

All Mooseheart students are familiar with the motto, "Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve," and the students in the Medical Explorers Club are preparing to do just that – serve others. The Medical Explorers Club was started in the 2021-2022 school year by Mooseheart's campus nurse, Kelsey Zollinger. Created for high school students who are interested in pursuing a career in the medical field, the club meets twice a month. Club members hear guest speakers, ask questions about the medical field, and learn new skills.
